My Jewish Museum

Discover the different ways the museum tells stories and displays objects. Use our Military Trail to find out more about Jewish men and women who served Britain.

Explore photographs and archive material to gain a greater understanding of charity in the East End. Create your own mini-Torah and mini-mezuzah taking inspiration from our collection.

Experience the work of a curator as you create your own mini-exhibition and show off what you learned during your visit.



Board Games: Prayer

Discover the beautiful and unique objects that tell us stories about how Jewish men and women pray.

Explore the museum collection by looking closely at objects through the theme of Prayer and take part in our sensory board games.

Experience a new way of examining museum objects through discussion questions, key facts, and sound clips.

Remembrance: Zikaron

Suitable only for ages 10+



Every Object Tells a Story

Discover the story of a spice box that was hidden in Germany and the impact the Nazi rule had on one family. A tale of loss, courage, rescue and faith.

Explore artefacts to contextualise both a historical understanding of what life was like in Nazi-occupied Europe and the Jewish tradition of Shabbat and Havdalah.

Reflect on the impact of the Kindertransport using authentic documents, paintings and objects to explore key themes of identity, rescue and tolerance.



First World War: Remember Me

Discover the personal stories of four British-born Jewish men and women who signed up to serve in the First World War. Through object and document handling students will gain a deeper insight into Jewish identity on the Front Line.

Explore the implications of being part of a minority community whilst serving on the Front and find out more about the lives of those who signed up.

Experience the work of a museum curator as students select objects for a mini exhibition on remembrance focusing on one individual for their display. Students will be encouraged to reflect on remembrance in a Jewish, national and local context.
