

DISCOVERING JUDAISM

Discovering Judaism is a series of interactive and multi-sensory workshops designed to encourage pupils to learn about the vibrancy of Jewish religion and culture today. Students will explore Judaism through key objects, contemporary films and guided discussions to understand what it means to be Jewish in Britain today.



Virtual Synagogue Visit

Join us for our virtual visit to a Jewish place of worship. Your students will experience Bevis Marks, a Sephardic synagogue built in the 18th century and still used today. This facilitated virtual tour uses video and sounds from the synagogue to explore a Jewish place of worship. 



This series of workshops explores topics of migration and belonging, faith and identity, and religion and culture. Through structured discussions and by looking closely at artefacts from our collection, students are able to reflect on the diversity and intersectionality of Jewish identity in both a historical and contemporary context.

The Sephardi Community


Explore the migration of the Sephardi community to Britain and learn more about the story of one family. Discover why Sephardi families left Spain for a better life in Britain and learn more about the traditions and customs of the community. Look closely at the oldest Hanukkah lamp in England and its importance to the Sephardi community of Bevis Marks Synagogue in the East End. Understand the role of the Jewish Museum as a community archive.

Migration & Movement

INVESTIGATING THE HOLOCAUST

Our varied range of workshops offers an insightful and thought-provoking approach to the Holocaust for students to build on their prior knowledge and understanding. Sessions are supported by looking closely at artefacts from our collection which stimulate deeper thinking and discussion. The museum also provides the opportunity for students to hear the testimony of Holocaust survivors and refugees from Nazism. Our programmes place a strong emphasis on enhancing students' thinking skills, enquiry, interpretation, analysis and moral development, and are delivered by nationally recognised experts in the field.

Holocaust: Collections

Explore artefacts, religious objects, personal possessions and key texts to understand the gradual loss of identity and dehumanization of the Jewish people during the Holocaust. Discover what life was like in Nazi-occupied Europe alongside the role of belief in the face of adversity. Reflect on the experiences of individual stories and relate this to the concepts of tolerance, respect, freedom and justice both in the past and today.

EXPLORING HISTORY

Exploring History is a programme of object-based interactive workshops designed to engage students with the history of Jewish religion and culture in Britain. Workshops encourage pupils to understand the complexity of people's lives, the process of change, the diversity of societies, and relationships between different groups.

Jewish East End

Discover the stories of real people and communities who migrated to London's changing East End in the early 20th century and the challenges they faced embarking on their new lives in Britain. Explore changing identities by looking closely at key objects to discover the impact of living in a new and diverse environment. Using historical enquiry skills students will be able to consider the challenges faced by immigrants to Britain and the positive impact they can make.

First World War

Students will be encouraged to reflect on the theme of remembrance and why it is important in a Jewish, national and local context.



Migration


